Management of

NEEDLE-STICK INJURY



1. Clean it


DO encourage bleeding by applying gentle pressure

DO wash with soap and water

Do not scrub the affected area

Do not suck the area to

remove the blood



2. Report it

Report the incident immediately to the supervisor or the designated Doctor at your hospital



3. Treat it

Find out the patient's HIV, Hep.B and Hep.C status and receive the appropriate treatment within 72 hours





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NEEDLE STICK INJURY PREVENTION- GUIDELINES

Our institution strictly follows the guidelines of Centre for Disease Control and Prevention

CDC provides the following guidelines for preventing needlestick injuries.

- 1. Use safety devices: Use safety devices, such as safety needles and sharps with engineered sharps injury protection (SESIP), that are designed to prevent needlestick
- Don't recapped needles: Do not recap needles, bend or break needles, or remove needles from disposable syringes by hand. Instead, use a mechanical device or onehanded technique to recap the needle.
- Dispose of needles properly: Dispose of used needles in appropriate sharps containers that are puncture-resistant and labelled for biohazardous waste.
- 4. Use personal protective equipment (PPE): Wear appropriate PPE, such as gloves, gowns, and masks, to protect against exposure to blood and other body fluids.
- 5. Properly handle and transport sharps: Handle and transport sharps safely by labelling containers with the appropriate biohazard symbol, securing them to prevent spillage or puncture, and using leak-proof secondary containers when necessary.
- 6. Report needle stick injuries: Report all needle stick injuries immediately to a supervisor and seek medical attention as soon as possible.

By following these guidelines, healthcare workers can significantly reduce the risk of needle stick injuries and prevent the transmission of blood borne pathogens, such as HIV, hepatitis B. and hepatitis C.



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AFTER A NEEDLE STICK INJURY - GUIDELINES

The Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) provides the following guidelines for managing needle stick injuries:

- 1. Wash the affected area immediately with soap and water.
- If the exposure was to the eyes, nose or mouth, rinse the area thoroughly with water or saline.
- 3. Report the injury immediately to the appropriate person in their workplace.
- 4. Seek medical evaluation and treatment as soon as possible.
- 5. If possible, identify the source patient and document the exposure incident.
- 6. Test the source patient for HIV, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C.
- Test the exposed employee for HIV, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C at the time of injury and at follow-up intervals as recommended by the CDC.
- 8. Administer post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) for HIV, if indicated, within 72 hours of the injury.
- Follow up with the exposed employee to ensure that he or she completes the recommended course of PEP and any necessary medical monitoring.

It is important to follow these guidelines to minimize the risk of infection and ensure the best possible outcome for the exposed employee.
